THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

The Federal Government is the central authority of the United States.

It is composed of three branches: the Executive, the Legislative, and the Judicial.

ARTICLE I

Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected by the People of the State in which they so reside, for six Years, and each Senator shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America. He shall hold his Office during the Term of four Years, and, together with the Vice President, shall be chosen in the following Manner: In each State, the Electors in the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.
